The commissioners of the Delaware Fort Authority dedicate this bridge to the memory of a great patriot, scientist and statesman and his honor name it name it the Benjamin Franklin Bridge January 17, 1956.

The Delaware River Bridge Joint Commission authorized by Act of the New Jersey Legislature, April 8, 1919, and by Act of the Rinnsylvania legislature July 9, 1919, to build this bridge over the Delaware River between Philadelphia and Camden. The cost of construction shared by Commonwealth of Rinnsylvania, the state of New Jersey and city of Philadelphia organized December 12, 1919. Began construction, January 6, 1922 and opened the bridge with ceremonies on July 1, 1926.
